In the matter of dealings in Illiquid Stock Options at the Bombay Stock Exchange

BACKGROUND OF THE CASE

1. Securities and Exchange Board of India (hereinafter referred to as "SEBI") observed large scale reversal of trades in stock options segment of Bombay Stock Exchange (hereinafter referred to as "BSE"). SEBI observed that such large scale reversal of trades in stock options lead to creation of artificial volume at BSE. In view of the same, SEBI conducted an investigation into the trading activities of certain entities in illiquid stock options at BSE for the period April 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015 (hereinafter referred to as "**Investigation Period**").
2. Pursuant to investigation, it was observed that a total of 2,91,744 trades comprising a substantial 81.40% of all the trades executed in stock options segment of BSE during the Investigation Period were non-genuine trades. It was observed that **Basant Kumar**

Sanganeria (hereinafter, referred to as “**Noticee**”), bearing PAN – AJIPS7201E, was one among the various entities who indulged in execution of reversal trades in stock options segment of BSE during the Investigation Period.

3. Such trades were observed to be non-genuine in nature and created false or misleading appearance of trading in terms of artificial volumes in stock options and therefore were alleged to be manipulative, deceptive in nature. In view of the same, SEBI initiated adjudication proceedings against the Noticee for violation of the provisions of regulations 3(a), (b), (c), (d), 4(1) and 4(2)(a) of SEBI (Prohibition of Fraudulent and Unfair Trade Practices) Regulations, 2003 (hereinafter referred to as “**PFUTP Regulations, 2003**”).

APPOINTMENT OF ADJUDICATING OFFICER

4. The undersigned was appointed as the Adjudicating Officer in the matter, conveyed vide communique dated September 27, 2021, under Section 19 read with Section 15 I(1) of the Securities and Exchange Board of India Act, 1992 (hereinafter referred to as “**SEBI Act, 1992**”) and Rule 3 of SEBI (Procedure for Holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 (hereinafter referred to as “**Adjudication Rules**”) to conduct adjudication proceedings in the manner specified under rule 4 of Adjudication Rules read with Section 15 I(1) and (2) of SEBI Act, 1992, and if satisfied that penalty is liable, impose such penalty as deemed fit in terms of Rule 5 of Adjudication Rules and Section 15HA of SEBI Act, 1992.

SHOW CAUSE NOTICE, REPLY AND HEARING

5. A Show Cause Notice bearing reference no. SEBI/HO/IID/AT/AM/2022/9137/1 dated March 03, 2022(hereinafter referred to as 'SCN') was issued to the Noticee under Rule 4(1) of the Adjudication Rules to show-cause as to why an inquiry should not be initiated against the Noticee and why penalty should not be imposed on the Noticee under Section 15HA of the SEBI Act, 1992 for the violations alleged to have been committed by the Noticee.
6. It was, *inter-alia*, alleged in the SCN that the Noticee had executed two non-genuine trades in one stock option contract which resulted in artificial volume of total 3,40,000 units. The summary of dealings of the Noticee in the Stock Option contract, in which the Noticee allegedly executed trades that were not genuine during the Investigation Period is as follows:

7. From the above table, the following is noted as regard to the dealings of the Noticee:
- a. The Noticee had executed two trades in one unique contract, wherein first sell trade in the said contract were reversed in second trade with the same counterparty on the same day.

- b. The trades executed by the Noticee in the above contract had noticeable difference in the buy and sell rates considering that the trades were reversed within 7 minutes, which indicates that these trades were non-genuine in nature.
 - c. The entire volume (3,40,000 units) generated by the Noticee in the above contract was artificial volume, and further, the artificial volume generated by the Noticee also contributed 6.55% of total market volume (51,90,000) in the said contract during the Investigation period.
8. The SCN vide reference no. SEBI/HO/IID/AT/AM/2022/9137/1 dated March 03, 2022 was served on the Noticee via Speed Post Acknowledgement Due (SPAD).
9. Subsequently, pursuant to Order dated May 13, 2022 passed by the Hon'ble Securities Appellate Tribunal (SAT), SEBI introduced a settlement scheme referred to as the SEBI Settlement Scheme, 2022 ("Scheme"), in terms of Regulation 26 of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Settlement Proceedings) Regulations, 2018 in the matter of Illiquid Stock Options. The Scheme provided a one-time opportunity to the entities against whom proceedings had been initiated and appeals against the said proceedings are pending before any forum or authority. SEBI issued a Public Notice dated August 19, 2022 about the Scheme and the modalities for availing the benefit of the Scheme. The Notice was also made available on the website of the BSE. The same was also intimated to the Noticee vide letter reference no. SEBI/HO/IID/P/OW/2022/31601 dated August 01, 2022 by way of Speed Post Acknowledgement Due (SPAD).

10. The Scheme was initially kept open during the period August 22, 2022 to November 21, 2022 and, subsequently, vide public notice dated November 22, 2022, extended till January 21, 2023. The Noticee did not avail of the settlement facility under the said Scheme. Therefore, the adjudication proceedings initiated vide the SCN stand revived and are being continued from the stage at which the said proceedings were kept pending.

11. Further, vide letter SEBI/HO/IIID/AT/AM/2023/07736/1 dated February 23, 2023, the Noticee was also granted an opportunity of personal hearing. The notice vide email dated Mar 11, 2023 responded that he wishes to avail hearing facility through online video-conferencing, which was held on March 15, 2023, at 3:00 PM through zoom video conference and attended by the Noticee himself. During the course of the hearing, the Noticee made oral submissions and sought some time to make written submissions. The notice vide email dated March 17, 2023 submitted its written submission wherein it repeated its oral submission, as summarised below: -

- a The noticee is a small trader dealing regularly in shares since a long time and transaction referred was normal trade and the noticee was unaware of any so called illiquid stocks as mentioned in SCN.
- b The noticee is a senior citizen and is suffering from health issues. The noticee suffered a huge loss in shares and taken huge loans from friends which he is unable to refund. The noticee received notice of SEBI settlement scheme but

was unable to participate due to the noticee suffering from financial problems and requests to take a sympathetic view and drop the case.

12. Considering the above, I am of the view that principles of natural justice have been duly complied with, as the SCN and hearing Notice were duly served upon the Noticee and hearing was also attended by the Noticee and subsequent written reply was also submitted by the Noticee.

13. The Noticee's submission that transaction was normal trade does not have any merit. Options as financial instruments, ordinarily, provide hedging avenues to investors. The trading of the Noticee in the instant matter was abnormal and was clearly designed to create artificial volumes in the illiquid stock option contracts as it fails to justify any of the normal strategies of hedging/ arbitrage. In my view, the abuse of such financial instruments, which are made available to the investors for the purpose of protection of their investment portfolios from the risks of adverse price movement and needs to be dealt with strictly. I also note that while the stock exchange provides a platform for carrying out the trades, the obligation to ensure genuineness of the trades executed on the exchange platform primarily lies on the clients. Thus, the submission of the Noticee that its transactions was a normal trade cannot be accepted. Further the Noticee being senior citizen suffering from health issues and suffered financial loss in the market does not absolve the noticee from the charges in the SCN.

14. While deciding the case, I also cannot lose sight of settled position of law that the charge should be established with valid reasons and in accordance with law. I,

therefore, deem it necessary to examine the charge based upon the trades of the Noticee and the supporting material as provided in the SCN.

CONSIDERATION OF ISSUES AND FINDINGS

15. I have perused the charges levelled against the Noticee and the documents / material available on record. The issues that arise for consideration in the present case are:

- a. *Whether the Noticee has violated provisions of regulations 3(a), (b), (c), (d), 4 (1) and 4(2) (a) of PFUTP Regulations, 2003?*
- b. *Does the violation, if any, attract monetary penalty under section 15HA of the SEBI Act, 1992?*
- c. *If so, what would be the quantum of monetary penalty that can be imposed on the Noticee after taking into consideration the factors mentioned in section 15J of the SEBI Act, 1992?*

16. Before proceeding further, I would like to refer to the relevant provisions of the PFUTP Regulations, 2003 as below:

“PFUTP Regulations, 2003.

3. Prohibition of certain dealings in securities

No person shall directly or indirectly—

- (a) buy, sell or otherwise deal in securities in a fraudulent manner;*
- (b) use or employ, in connection with issue, purchase or sale of any security listed or proposed to be listed in a recognized stock exchange, any manipulative or deceptive device or contrivance in contravention of the provisions of the Act or the rules or the regulations made there under;*

- (c) *employ any device, scheme or artifice to defraud in connection with dealing in or issue of securities which are listed or proposed to be listed on a recognized stock exchange;*
- (d) *engage in any act, practice, course of business which operates or would operate as fraud or deceit upon any person in connection with any dealing in or issue of securities which are listed or proposed to be listed on a recognized stock exchange in contravention of the provisions of the Act or the rules and the regulations made there under.*

4. Prohibition of manipulative, fraudulent and unfair trade practices

- (1) *Without prejudice to the provisions of regulation 3, no person shall indulge in a manipulative, fraudulent or an unfair trade practice in securities markets.*
- (2) *Dealing in securities shall be deemed to be a fraudulent or an unfair trade practice if it involves fraud and may include all or any of the following, namely:—*
 - (a) *Knowingly indulging in an act which creates false or misleading appearance of trading in the securities market;”*

17. The allegation against the Noticee is that, while dealing in the stock option contracts at BSE during the Investigation Period, the Noticee had executed reversal trades on the same day within 7 minutes with the same counterparty, which were allegedly non-genuine trades and the same had resulted in generation of artificial volume in stock option contracts at BSE. Reversal trades are those trades in which an entity places its buy or sell positions in a contract with subsequent sell or buy positions with the same counterparty during the same day.

These reversal trades are alleged to be non-genuine trades as they:

- lack basic trading rationale,
- lead to false or misleading appearance of trading in terms of generation of artificial volumes and hence are deceptive and manipulative.

18. I note from the trade log of the Noticee that the Noticee had executed two non-genuine trades in one unique contract in the stock options segment of BSE during the Investigation Period which resulted in the creation of artificial volume of a total of 3,40,000 units in the said contract. A summary of the non-genuine trades of the Noticee executed on January 20, 2015 in the said contract is as follows:

19. I note from the trade log that the orders by the Noticee and the counter-party were placed almost simultaneously, within a gap of less than a second, both for the sell and buy trades. Further, the trade executed by the Noticee in the contract was squared up within a short span of time i.e. within seven minutes with the same counter-party. To illustrate, the Noticee, at 13:55:06 hours on January 20, 2015, entered into a sell trade with the counterparty, viz. Mahavir Finance Pvt Ltd, for 1,70,000 units at Rs. 1.7 per unit, which was reversed by a buy trade at 14:02:03 hours, within 7 minutes, with the same counterparty for 1,70,000 units at Rs. 0.2 per unit. Thus, while dealing in the said contract during the Investigation Period, the Noticee executed the reversal trade with

same counterparty on the same day with noticeable price difference in sell and buy price which indicates that these trades were non-genuine in nature.

20. Thus, the Noticee, through his dealing in the said contract viz. “NHPC15JAN24.00CEW4” executed non-genuine trades in the said contract during the Investigation Period, and thereby generated an artificial volume of 3,40,000 units, which made up 6.55 % of total market volume (51,90,000 units) in the said contract during this period.

21. The fact that the transactions executed by the Noticee are not genuine is evident from the trade log of the Noticee which reveals that the trades executed by the Noticee in the above contract had a noticeable difference in the buy rate and sell rate considering that the trades were reversed with the same counterparty in a matter of just 7 minutes. Such a short span of time taken for reversing the trades in an illiquid stock option contract with a noticeable variation in prices of the said contract makes it evident that these trades executed by the Noticee were not genuine and indicates a prior meeting of minds with a *mala fide* intent to execute the reversal trades at a pre-determined price.

22. Further, I observe that it cannot be a mere coincidence that in both the buy trade and the sell trade, the time gap between the orders of the Noticee and the counter-party was less than one second and that the Noticee could also match the entire quantity of his reversal trades with the same counterparty with whom the Noticee had undertaken

the first leg of the respective trade. This is but an outcome of a meeting of minds and a deliberate attempt to deal in such a fashion.

23. In this context, I place reliance on the judgment of Hon'ble Supreme Court in the matter in respect of **SEBI vs. Rakhi Trading Private Limited** (Civil Appeal Nos. 1969, 3174-3177 and 3180 of 2011 decided on February 8, 2018), in which the Hon'ble Supreme Court held that - *"Considering the reversal transactions, quantity, price and time and sale, parties being persistent in number of such trade transactions with huge price variations, it will be too naive to hold that the transactions are through screen-based trading and hence anonymous. Such conclusion would be over-looking the prior meeting of minds involving synchronization of buy and sell order and not negotiated deals as per the board's circular. The impugned transactions are manipulative/deceptive device to create a desired loss and/or profit. Such synchronized trading is violative of transparent norms of trading in securities....."*

24. Further, the Hon'ble SAT, in its judgement dated September 14, 2020 in the matter of **Global Earth Properties and Developers Pvt. Ltd.** relied upon the aforesaid judgement of Hon'ble Supreme Court and held that, *"It is not a mere coincidence that the Appellants could match the trades with the counter party with whom he had undertaken the first leg of respective trade. In our opinion, the trades were non-genuine trades and even though direct evidence is not available in the instant case but in the peculiar facts and circumstances of the present case there is an irresistible inference*

that can be drawn that there was meeting of minds between the Appellants and the counter parties, and collusion with a view to trade at a predetermined price.”

25. I note that while direct evidence may not be forthcoming in the present matter as regards to meeting of minds or collusion of the Noticee with other entity, there is guidance from the aforesaid order of the Hon'ble Supreme Court where it lays emphasis on the 'preponderance of probabilities' in each case to arrive at a decision considering the following:

- the isolated trade and reversal in the same option contract,
- the same counter party being involved in both the trades,
- the gap between the trade and the reversal being just a few minutes,
- the noticeable difference in the buy and sell rate within same day.

I cannot but conclude the trades have been executed with an ulterior motive to create artificial volume and are not genuine.

26. Considering the aforesaid factors, I conclude that the trading behaviour of the Noticee has resulted in creating an appearance of artificial trading volume in the contract. In view of the above, I find that the allegation of violation of regulations 3(a), (b), (c), (d), 4(1) and 4(2)(a) of PFUTP Regulations, 2003 by the Noticee stands established.

27. In view of the same, I am convinced that it is a fit case for imposition of monetary penalty on the Noticee under the provisions of section 15HA of the SEBI Act, 1992 which read as under:

“Penalty for fraudulent and unfair trade practices.

Adjudication Order in respect of Basant Kumar Sangneria in the matter of dealings in Illiquid Stock Options at BSE

15HA. *If any person indulges in fraudulent and unfair trade practices relating to securities, he shall be liable to a penalty which shall not be less than five lakh rupees but which may extend to twenty-five crore rupees or three times the amount of profits made out of such practices, whichever is higher.”*

28. While determining the quantum of penalty under Section 15HA of the SEBI Act, it is important to consider the relevant factors as stipulated in Section 15J of the SEBI Act which reads as under:

“Factors to be taken into account by the adjudicating officer.

15J. *While adjudging quantum of penalty under section 15-I, the adjudicating officer shall have due regard to the following factors, namely:-*

(a) the amount of disproportionate gain or unfair advantage, wherever quantifiable, made as a result of the default;

(b) the amount of loss caused to an investor or group of investors as a result of the default;

(c) the repetitive nature of the default.

Explanation.— For the removal of doubts, it is clarified that the power of an adjudicating officer to adjudge the quantum of penalty under sections 15A to 15E, clauses (b) and (c) of section 15F, 15G, 15H and 15HA shall be and shall always be deemed to have been exercised under the provisions of this section.”

29. I observe that the material available on record does not quantify any disproportionate gains or unfair advantage, if any, made by the Noticee and the losses, if any, suffered

by the investors due to such violations on part of the said Noticee. However, the Noticee had entered into non-genuine trades, which created a false and misleading appearance of trading volumes in the respective contract at pre-meditated prices, thereby leading to violation of regulation 3(a),(b),(c),(d) and 4(1),(2)(a) of the PFUTP Regulations, 2003.

ORDER

30. Having considered all the facts and circumstances of the case, the material available on record, the factors mentioned in section 15J of the SEBI Act, 1992 and in exercise of power conferred upon me under section 15-I of the SEBI Act, 1992 read with Rule 5 of the Adjudication Rules, 1995, I hereby impose following penalty under Section 15HA of the SEBI Act, 1992 on the Noticee:

I am of the view that the said penalty is commensurate with the lapse/ omission on the part of the Noticee.

31. The Noticee shall remit/ pay the said amount of penalty within 45 days of receipt of this order through online payment facility available on the website of SEBI, i.e. www.sebi.gov.in on the following path, by clicking on the payment link: ENFORCEMENT → Orders → Orders of AO → PAY NOW.

32. The aforesaid Noticee shall forward the details/ confirmation of penalty so paid to “The Division Chief (Enforcement Department-1, DRA-6), Securities and Exchange Board of India, SEBI Bhavan, Plot No. C – 4 A, “G” Block, Bandra Kurla Complex, Bandra (E), Mumbai – 400 051.” The Noticee shall also provide the following details while forwarding payment information:

33. In the event of failure to pay the said amount of penalty within 45 days of the receipt of this Order, SEBI may initiate consequential actions including but not limited to recovery proceedings under section 28A of the SEBI Act, 1992 for realization of the said amount of penalty along with interest thereon, *inter alia*, by attachment and sale of movable and immovable properties.

34. In terms of the provisions of Rule 6 of the Adjudication Rules, a copy of this order is being sent to the Noticee and also to the Securities and Exchange Board of India.
